
GEETANJALI SHREE

Geetanjali Shree won the International Booker Prize, an annual literary award during the year 2022 for her translated novel 'Tomb of Sand'. The novel, titled originally *Ret Samadbi*, was the first Hindi book to be shortlisted for the high-profile award, which recognizes fiction from all around the world. It has been translated into English by Daisy Rockwell, a translator, painter and writer. This book has made history by becoming the first Hindi novel — and the first from India as well as South Asia — to win the International Booker Prize for translating books published in the UK and Ireland.

Owing to the COVID-19 pandemic, the two writers did not interact but exchanged their ideas via email. The creative terrain that the duo decided to tread came up in the form of this luminous novel with Geetanjali Shree's well-steeped insight into Hindi literature and north Indian life, and Daisy's hugely layered enjoyment of keenness in language. In her acceptance speech, Geetanjali Shree said that the book was an elegy for the world we inhabit, a lasting energy that retains hope in the face of impending doom.



The book tells the story of an 80-year-old widow who dares to brush off conventions and confronts the ghosts of her experiences during the subcontinent's tumultuous partition into India and Pakistan in 1947. A polyphonic novel of identity and belonging, 'Tomb of Sand' particularizes the old woman's experiences confronting the unresolved trauma and the destructive impact of borders and boundaries, the death of her husband and her will to resurface to gain a new lease on life. The novel's spellbinding flamboyance and strong compassion weave youth and age, male and female, family and nation into a kaleidoscopic whole.



The screen adaptation of Saadat Hasan Manto's classic Toba Tek Singh written and directed by Ketan Mehta, starring Pankaj Kapoor in the title role was organized for the students of Elective English of BA III on September 15, 2022. The screening was followed by an active discussion on this work of fiction that encapsulates the symbolic sundering of territory, sanity and moral order with the partition as the backdrop.

A Declamation contest was organized on the topic 'Social Media' on September 16, 2022. Eight students participated in the event. Shailendra Singh of BCA-III was declared as the best orator.

An online essay writing competition was organized on November II, 2022. Ten students mailed their entries on the topic 'Knowledge: The New Rich' and Shrianshika Saini of BA-I, Sanjana Kumari Gupta of BA-I and Taniya of BA-II grabbed the first, second and third positions respectively.

On November 11, 2022, a hands-on activity was conducted for the students of BA-I, Functional English on 'Word Stress' and a YouTube video on 'Are You Struggling with Understanding Word Stress? by Hadar' was screened too. The activity was conducted with a view to make the students understand that the lexical stress errors in English are frequently very damaging because of the disastrous domino effect they put into motion

A Quiz competition was organized on January 23, 2023, in collaboration with the Department of Economics to create awareness about G-20 and its working among the students of the institution as India assumes the G-20 presidency this year. Five teams of three students per team participated with great zeal and enthusiasm in the said event. The five-round competition included Objective, Direct answer, visual and tie-breaking rounds, which engaged the students for one and a half hours. The competition was won by Team E.

A group discussion on "International Cooperation and the Challenges of Climate Change" was organized on January 24, 2023, to familiarize students with the issue of climatic change, keeping in mind the G20 Summit 2023. More than 30 students participated in the discussion and raised their viewpoints on the topic. The event concluded with a speech by Dr Ch. Anupama. She highlighted the importance of staying educated and informed about climate change as she believed that climate-related jeopardies to health, livelihoods, food security, human security and economic growth are expected to escalate with global warming.

An Inter-college Declamation contest was organized in collaboration with Aruna Asaf Ali Memorial Trust, Sector-44, Chandigarh on the topic 'Man makes Character, Character makes a Man' on February 2023. Students from various colleges participated in the event. The running trophy was won by Post Graduate Government College, Sector-46, Chandigarh. The individual first, second and third prizes were won by Arjun of Post Graduate Government College, Sector-46, Ansh Tyagi of Post Graduate Government College, Sector-46 and Vatika of Post Graduate Government College, Sector-42 respectively. A consolation prize was given to Shailendra Singh of Post Graduate Government College, Sector-46.
